Since the World Day was launched by Arigatou International in 2008, it has mobilized over 300 activities in over 85 countries to improve the lives of children worldwide.

It was not just a normal Satsang programme at Peace Service Centre (Shanti Sewa Ashram) on 20th November 2015 when the bells were ringing, some young, adult and women chanting *slokas* and *bhajans* (hymns) with soothing music of harmonium (traditional piano) and tabala (a traditional drum) The event was organized at Peace Service Centre, Koteshwor, Kathmandu, Nepal.

Peace Service Centre is a common platform that is working to establish peace, progress and prosperity in the society reaching the grass root level and trying to solve their problem as much as possible through various methodologies with support of local to global partners.

This Interfaith Satsang (a spiritual discourse or sacred gathering) was special not just because the chief guest and speaker of the programme was Mr Kul Chandra Gautam, (an Assistant Secretary General of the UN and Deputy Executive Director of UNICEF. He was Special Advisor to the Prime Minister of Nepal on International Affairs and the Peace Process. He is a seasoned diplomat and civic leader and serves on the Boards of a number of international and national foundations and charitable organizations as chairman, member or advisor) but the hall was filled by approximately 70 people from 5 years old toddler to 60 above adult who keenly attended it for more than 2 and half hour.

Mr Hari Sodari, the rapporter of the programme kindly requested children to chant hymns for world peace whereas Mr Gautam lit the candle for peace which was followed by faith based and non-faith based people

Interfaith Prayer; Satsang

A special talk was delivered by **Mr Kul Chandra Gautam** as a chairperson of the programme, who is also the chair of the DPAC preparing and planning committee. He highlighted on the universal condition of the children focusing how this global issue should be resolved by all the faith based and non faith based leaders working at local, national, regional to international arena.

Illustrating the wretched condition of Nepalese due to catastrophic earthquake and economic blockade he was concerned for deteriorating quality of life and living of Nepalese overall and children at the core. Highlighting the importance of education and its impact on the days to come he exceedingly urged everyone presented in the programme to be prepared to protect the rights of the children and work incessantly.

Similarly **Dr Chintamani Yogi**, the founder of the Centre also highlighted the importance of education and requested government and protesters to be tolerant towards school children. He advocated that a country can only develop if the children would be given good education. He also said that the future of any country depends on the level of education that students are imparted on. So, recommended everyone to be broadminded for the protection of child right.

Mr Jagannath Kandel, the coordinator of the DPAC organizing committee for Nepal who has been the international youth member for the preparation and planning of DPAC during 2010 and 2011 illustrated the importance DPAC, its aim and results it wants to produce.

Other youth of Centre such as Kriti Giri Yogi, Samrat Nath Yogi and Yubraj Chhetri also garlanded the program on importance of Centre that works for the vulnerable society mainly with children and women.

It was a programme where students were mainly from four faiths; Hindus, Buddhists, Muslims and Christians. These children read aloud the placard on child right, violence against children and to end poverty.
